Dr. Strauss and *The Creator Revealed* 

This year's final Academy of Senior Professionals luncheon on Monday, May 13<sup>th</sup>, 2019, may provoke some discussion regarding the "Big



Bang" origin of the universe.

Dr. Michael Strauss is an experimental particle physicist currently doing research on the ATLAS detector, one of the two multipurpose particle detectors located on the Large Hadron Collider at CERN near Geneva, Switzerland. Since 1995, he has also been a professor at the University of Oklahoma. He is also a Christian and his web-site (<a href="www.michaelgstrauss.com">www.michaelgstrauss.com</a>) and blog are a result of discussions he has had and questions he has received about the relationship between science, rational thinking, objective evidence, and Christian faith.

His desire was to write a book on God, creation and science that would be easy to read so that young people entering higher education could defend their faith in discussions with

non-Christian professors and students who might pose challenges to their faith.

When Dr. Strauss spoke at ASP a few years ago, he had begun writing his book but had not yet finished it. That book, *The Creator Revealed: A Physicist Examines the Big Bang and the Bible,* is now available.

As a scientist who is a Christian, Dr. Strauss is sometimes attacked by both scientists and Christians for things he says and believes. So, in his blog, in his speaking, and in his writing, he tries to show that beliefs in the biblical God, the Bible itself, and the science of the big bang are not only based on abundant evidence but are completely compatible with each other.

# SNU Connections by Howard Culbertson

The SNU Connections interviewee at the May ASP luncheon will be SNU history professor Lauren Brand. On Twitter, she describes herself as a "coffee drinker and student of the Native American West." The interview will focus on her doctoral dissertation for Rice University in



which she examined Indian Territory during the time of the Gold Rush.

Dr. Brand is a 2010 SNU graduate who was a McNair Scholars participant. That federally-funded program seeks to open doors for graduate study by students from under-represented segments of society.

A glance at the opening lines of Dr. Brand's doctoral dissertation reveals that she's a good writer. While many doctoral dissertations make for very "dry" reading, hers does not. It begins: "Colonel Henry Dodge of the U.S. dragoons waited nervously at the bottom of a high bluff on the plains of what is now southwestern Oklahoma. A Comanche man on a white horse was barreling down the bluff toward Dodge . . ."

Dr. Brand tries to pass on that love for good writing by working specifically with freshmen in a fall teamteaching arrangement with an English professor to help those first-year students improve their writing skills.

She has served as managing editor of the *Presidential Studies Quarterly* and as visiting assistant editor of the *Journal of Southern History* where her main contribution was fact-checking book reviews and full-length articles.

In a volunteer capacity at the Oklahoma Historical Society, Dr. Brand organized primary source document collections (including more than 25 boxes of papers from Oklahoma pioneer William Harn) and entered collection data into the historical society catalog.



#### *Book Discussion* by Barbara Culbertson



I hope you are looking forward to hearing Michael Strauss this May.

Several years ago, I was mesmerized by a program on PBS about a tunnel in Switzerland where some scientists were making protons zoom very fast and collide into each other. I had no idea what they

were talking about, but it was totally fascinating.

Then, lo and behold, Michael Strauss showed up as an ASP speaker. Wow. Someone who actually works at that tunnel place. Maybe it's more interesting to me because we've loved travelling through some l-o-o-o-n-g tunnels in Switzerland! (Side note: I don't think they allow cars to go through the one where tiny particles collide.)

Well, here we are at our May ASP meeting, and the scientist is back! This time we now have a book by this brainy guy which will enrich our understanding of his lecture.

As a young boy, Strauss says he thought science and faith were in perfect harmony. Then, he began encountering Christians who believed modern science contradicted the Bible. Strauss notes -- reminiscent of the Apostle Paul listing his credentials -- that as a preacher's kid, he is well-qualified to ponder the correspondence between science and scripture.

Strauss masterfully discloses in *The Creator Revealed* how science can reinforce our belief in God and in the veracity of the Bible. Dr. Strauss has made this volume readable for laymen. I'm about half-way through the book and am totally fascinated! Get a copy of *The Creator Revealed* and join our May 9 Book Discussion group.
